





Please join an exciting new matching gift campaign to repair and renew our sanctuary. The purpose of the campaign, entitled "Over the Top," is to upgrade the

sanctuary by replacing the leaking sanctuary roof, painting the interior/exterior, improving the lighting and sound systems, and repairing and updating the organ.

What are the reasons for the campaign?

Our well-used sanctuary needs repair. Seven years ago, experts gave our roof five more years to "live." The leaking roof needs to be replaced by fall 2015. Interior/exterior painting is long overdue. An Excel Energy Audit recommended changes that will save energy while improving the brightness in the sanctuary (4.8 years

payback). Badly needed is a modern sound system that will enable all parts of the service to be heard in all parts of the sanctuary. The organ, nearly 60 years old, was last

refurbished and upgraded thirty years ago in 1985. It failed to work at the 11 p.m. Christmas Eve service.

Matching gift



Seven Last Words by Steven Morgan

On Good Friday, April 3, at 7 p.m. worship, the Chancel Choir, along with a small chamber ensemble, presents a world premiere work called *Seven Last Words* by Americanborn, Japan-based, composer Steven Morgan. Two years ago, the choir sang the North American premiere of Morgan's *In Pace: A Requiem of Peace*.

Steven draws upon the words of the poet Mark Strand (1934–2014), a Canadian-born American poet, essayist, and translator, who taught at Harvard and most recently at Columbia before his recent death last November. He was appointed Poet Laureate Consultant in Poetry to the Library of Congress in 1990.

The music for choir, soloists, and small chamber ensemble also includes three chorales for the assembly to sing and some moments of reflection. Pastor Caitlin will deliver a sermon.

There will also be Good Friday worship at noon which follows the liturgy for Good Friday and offers ample opportunity for silent reflection. On this particular day, it is certainly possible to attend both services if one wishes, as both services are so different. Please join us on Good Friday as we journey together toward the cross in the promise of salvation.

Throughout Holy Week, Augustana's choirs will enhance worship with anthems of faith and meditation.

Come Together in My Name

Some have claimed this to be the age of the megachurch, congregations with memberships that total in the thousands. They have become the darlings of the media. We are captivated by them. Those of us in smaller congregations are sometimes envious of them. Some of these megachurches have their own video production centers, parking lot attendants, even restaurants and aerobic classes. They offer families support services that go far beyond what small congregations can offer.

There is one thing, however, that both large churches and small churches must offer, and that is Christ. He is the reason we have church. He must be the center of all we do in our congregation. All our social and entertainment programs, as important and helpful as they are, cannot take the place of "the one thing that is needful."

There are very few places in the gospels where Jesus mentions the function of the church. In the early verses of Matthew 18 he addresses the issue of church discipline. Later, in the passage above, he mentions that "where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them." Two or three is a pretty small congregation!

There is also no place in the Bible where it uses the word "success." That word is not used to describe any situation commented on in Holy Scripture. But the word that is used on a regular basis is "faithful." The implication here is that the two or three who are faithful can and do make up a gathering where Christ is in their midst.



As Augustana Lutheran Church continues on the quest to seek a new pastor, we will be facing other challenges as well. We are on the cusp of starting a program to raise money to do some exciting renovations of the sanctuary. We will be shifting some staff positions around because of the recent retirement of Malise de Bree. I am

thinking that when these changes are complete, Augustana will physically and functionally look like a very different place from when I joined you this past August.

But in the light of this post-Easter day, let us never forget that faithfulness is the important mark of the church. Churches come in all shapes and all sizes. But the real mark of the church is the concept of two or three gathered in the name of Christ. It is certainly small by the world's standards. But God has never been really that concerned about appearances. If that were

the case, why would he only arrange for only a couple of women to see the resurrected Lord? Two or three...it always starts small and grows from there.

A Good Friday Monument or an Easter Movement?





People with Good Emotional Health...

- believe that there is a good balance to their life between leisure time, activity, and work;
- feel good about themselves;
- believe that there is a purpose to their lives;
- are able to accept changes better and just go with the flow;
- enjoy living, and know the value of fun and laughter;
- have less stress and are better equipped to deal with stress;

- have better relationships with others;
- and are contented with their lives.

Tips for Positive Emotional Well-Being

- Make time for reflection. Meditate. Pray.
- Spend time with others whose company you enjoy.
- Exercise. It protects physical and emotional health, relieves stress, and makes you feel good.
- Spend time in the sun. Sunlight bursts your mood.
- Laugh. Never underestimate the power of laughing.
- Cry...if you are sad, allow yourself to cry.
- Deal with your emotions. Learn how to properly deal with stress, anger, and anxiety instead of keeping them bottled up inside.
- Be healthy inside. Avoid junk food and stick to a healthy diet. Limit alcohol use.

Musica Sacra Chamber Orchestra Masterworks

Two-Way Street, featuring The Narrators Philip Ficsor, Violin

This is collaborative Story-Telling on an Orchestral Scale!

In MSCO's most compelling collaboration yet, the orchestra teams up with Denver's story-telling ensemble, The Narrators, for a program that explores the narrative qualities in great music as well as the musical qualities in great stories. They will have paid attention to how the music affects them, inspires feelings within them, evokes story lines, but most of all how it relates to their everyday lives. This side of the Two-Way Street culminates in their telling of the story they have found in the music, in collaboration with a performance by MSCO. On the other side of the street, as it were, The Narrators will fashion their own stories to which MSCO must react and respond with music that illuminates and completes their narratives. Three as-yet-unnamed masterworks will accompany the stories created in The Narrators' bold, honest style.

While this much of the program illustrates the Two-Way Street between two genres of art, and between different kinds of performing artists on stage, a second Two-Way Street is yet to be explored—the one joining artists and audience. This final facet of the program will allow audience members to write their own stories to the music they hear, and if they wish, will have their stories interpreted live before the audience that very night by the talented and insightful Narrators.

Theater and Theology brings members of Rocky Mountain Synod congregations in and near Denver to productions of the Denver Center

for the Performing Arts. After viewing a play, we do a talk-back discussion with cast members on theological issues raised in the play. Personal Care Kits:

Resurrecting hope this Easter season

When Lutheran World Relief distributes Personal Care Kits, it's often to people who have lost everything. In the aftermath of an earthquake, or having fled from violence as their homes were overtaken, they clasp a towel from a faraway place, with a bar of soap, a toothbrush etc. In washing up, they know that they have not been forsaken by the world.

The very simple gesture of giving a Personal Care Kit can give someone the encouragement to start anew. You can share God's grace and love by providing that simple comfort.

Assembling a Personal Care Kit

Include the following items in each Personal Care Kit:

	1 light-weight bath-size towel (maximum 52" x 27"), dark color recommended
Sining School Sc	2 bath-size bars of soap (4 to 5 oz.), any brand, in original wrapping
Total Control of the	1 adult-size toothbrush in its original packaging
	1 sturdy comb, remove packaging
	1 metal nail clippers (attached file optional), remove packaging

Toothbrush multi-packs may be used by sealing an individual toothbrush in a business-size envelope—no plastic bags or wrap.

Do not add other items or leave out any of the items listed. All items should be new and in good condition. Wrap all the items in the towel and tie securely with ribbons or yarn. Do not enclose it or any of its contents in plastic bags.

- Please give new items only, except where otherwise noted
- Please do not donate items with any religious symbols, messages, or your congregation's name.
- Please do not donate any items decorated with a U.S. flag, patriotic or military symbols, or references to the armed forces, including camouflage.

Bring kits to the box in Augustana's Fellowship Hall between April 12 and Pentecost, May 24!

Gifts for shipping

Monetary gifts for shipping and toothpaste are also accepted. It costs Lutheran World Relief about \$2.65 per Personal Care Kit to add toothpaste and deliver it overseas. If you are not able to assemble kits, consider giving a donation to help LWR ship the kits. Make checks payable to Augustana and memo "LWR Shipping."
