Thank you, one and all—behind the scenes and up front! Congregation and staff worked to welcome visitors and members, children and adults, into the life-giving way of Jesus. He is risen, indeed!

The Easter season's 50 days include my oneyear anniversary as your Senior Pastor on May 5. What a year it's been! I'm utterly inspired by your commitment to the gospel through your congregation. The level of active participation by so many of you enliven ministry every day while the lay leadership graciously spends time, expertise, and energy on God's mission through Augustana. I meant what I said in my Easter sermon: Our bodies are meant to share the joys and burdens of this life



with other people. Being church together as the BODY of Christ is how this works. Christ is risen, indeed!

Shimmering Light and Color

Easter was a truly glorious day at Augustana! The focal point was our resplendent Easter art, one of many Augustana projects and ministries under the umbrella of **Welcome 150**, as we prepare to celebrate Augustana's 150th anniversary in 2028.

A classroom was transformed into an Art Room, where we were surrounded by bottles of glue and buckets of colored fabric pieces, prepared by our extraordinary Artist in Residence, Ken Phillips. Together, we did "mosaic-by-number."

It was our Art Captains who facilitated each two-hour session (thank you!). But even they at first wondered if we would be able to finish the project by Easter. It seemed overwhelming, even impossible. What I soon realized was that we were creating something not only beautiful, but transformational. We *individually* all had a part in the whole, but any one of us could not have accomplished it alone. We needed each other.

Over 75 people of all ages joined together over 9 weeks, giving 200 hours of their time. Each one of the estimated 17,000 fabric mosaic pieces were glued in place as a gift to the Augustana community, creating a tapestry for Easter that proclaims in shimmering light and color that "Christ is Risen!" What a spectacular way to announce the good news of Easter!

I've had several inquiries about doing more art projects like this. This Easter project was made possible through a grant from the Augustana Foundation. If anyone would like to underwrite a future project, perhaps as a memorial or an

offering of thanksgiving to the community, I would be pleased to hear from you.

It was my privilege to organize this project, and I am grateful for all who participated!

Thanks to Your Generosity

Thanks to your generosity, the first Welcome 150 funded project has begun!

In mid-April construction fencing was installed near the Fairfax entrance, where the building's chiller equipment is housed in the brick enclosure attached to the main building. (The chiller is the machinery that cools the air for our building's air conditioning.) Activity will continue for several weeks, as the old equipment is removed, the new equipment is installed, inspections take place, etc. There will be times when the building does not have functioning air conditioning—be prepared if warm weather comes early. There may also be times when access from Fairfax will be limited—a large crane is needed to remove the old equipment and lift the new equipment into place.

Thanks to your generosity, the second Welcome 150 project will soon launch on the second floor

of the education wing. The old ceiling tiles will be replaced, the ceiling-air handling units above the drop-ceiling will be replaced with quieter energy efficient units, and new LED light fixtures will be installed. This will result in quieter spaces and a more efficient space for meetings and other activities.

Later this summer, work will begin campus-wide through a \$150,000 Federal Emergency Management Agency grant to modernize and enhance our security systems. Today, three separate systems monitored by three different companies manage our fire alarm, burglar alarm and access controls. Through a competitive bid process, one firm was selected to provide an integrated system


covering these security areas. The project is comprised of the following:


- A more flexible, automated and comprehensive system will control access throughout the campus through new keypads. Each of our 41 exterior doors will now have alarm contacts so it can easily be determined which one is ajar. Additionally, we will modernize the cameras to capture a wider view of our exterior areas and entryways.
- Another component is the extension of the fencing that surrounds the Augustana Early Learning Center play area from that entrance up the hill to the Fairfax entrance, providing an additional layer of security to our main floor spaces.
- If sufficient funds are available after completion of these projects, immovable concrete bollards

will be strategically placed to protect our buildings.

Thanks to your generosity, we have received commitments to Welcome 150 of nearly \$5.2 million. \$2.5 million is in the bank, but we are about to start spending that down, as work outlined above progresses. These funds are currently invested in non-volatile investments with a current yield of 4.3%. Our investment advisor has recommended investing in short-term instrument to earn a modest return, as these funds will need to be readily available over the next few years as we tackle our list of projects.

May is Mental Health Awaveness Month

Health Ministry

Millions of people are affected by mental illness each year. Across the country, many people just like you work, perform, create, compete, laugh, love and inspire every day.

- 22.8% of U.S. adults experienced mental illness in 2021 (57.8 million people). This represents 1 in 5 adults.
- 16.5% of U.S. youth aged 6-17 experienced a mental health disorder in 2016 (7.7 million people).

Diagnosing mental illness isn't a straightforward science. We can't test for it the same way we can test blood sugar levels for diabetes. Each condition has its own set of unique symptoms, though symptoms often overlap.

Each illness has its own symptoms, but common signs of mental illness in adults and adolescents can include the following:

- Excessive worrying or fear
- · Feeling excessively sad or low
- Confused thinking or problems concentrating and learning
- Extreme mood changes, including uncontrollable "highs" or feelings of euphoria
- Prolonged or strong feelings of irritability or anger

- · Avoiding friends and social activities
- Difficulties understanding or relating to other people
- Changes in sleeping habits or feeling tired and low energy
- Changes in eating habits such as increased hunger or lack of appetite
- Difficulty perceiving reality (delusions or hallucinations, in which a person experiences and senses things that don't exist in objective reality)
- Inability to perceive changes in one's own feelings, behavior or personality
- Overuse of substances like alcohol or drugs
- Multiple physical ailments without obvious causes (such as headaches, stomach aches, vague and ongoing "aches and pains")
- Thinking about suicide
- Inability to carry out daily activities or handle daily problems and stress
- An intense fear of weight gain or concern with appearance

Mental health conditions can also begin to develop in young children. Because they're still learning how to identify and talk about thoughts and emotions, their most obvious symptoms are behavioral. Symptoms in children may include the following:

Changes in school performance



- Excessive worry or anxiety—for instance, fighting to avoid bed or school
- Hyperactive behavior
- Frequent nightmares
- · Frequent disobedience or aggression
- Frequent temper tantrums

If you or someone you know may be experiencing these symptoms, reach out to your doctor for an assessment. Talk with your family or friends.

Write your state legislator

Contacting your state legislator makes a difference whether it's a call or a note. Below are two bills that you may want to support.

HB25-1277 – This bill prohibits retailers from selling certain fuel products without a warning impact label regarding air pollutant, greenhouse gases, health impacts and global warming.

HB25-1013 – The Right to Family and Community Connection – This bill would ensure that those incarcerated may maintain family and community connections through in-person visits, phone calls, and video visits, without restriction as a disciplinary measure. The bill has bipartisan support, passed the House, and on April 1, 2025, was introduced in the Senate.





Progress on all four buildings!

The past month has seen a lot of activity on the Augustana Homes building site.

- For building 1, interior finishes are continuing, and the first two units located on the far east end of the project are very close to completion. Two very attractive and functional homes are almost completed.
- Building 2 has the exterior finishes and brick work complete. The electrical, plumbing and HVAC rough-ins have been completed and the drywall has been hung. Interior finishes will begin shortly.
- Building 3 has completed all framing, and the roof and wall sheathing have been installed. The dry-in process will begin soon, with the roof and windows being completed.
- Building 4 has a completed foundation that has been backfilled and graded, and the framing on the subfloor will begin soon. Now that all the building foundations and backfill have been completed, exterior grading of the site will not be far away!

Also some exciting news from HFH: The first homeowner has been selected for the Augustana Homes neighborhood! We are looking forward to meeting this family, as well as the next seven families that will make up the new, vibrant neighborhood.
